Silver Award Girl Scouts

Silver Award Girl Scouts and sisters Sophia and Olivia Thornburg wanted to increase access to books and bring their community together safely, so they built a Little Free Library book-sharing box in their hometown of La Grande, Oregon. They collected books to stock the library, and practiced project management and construction skills through the building process. The girls created an educational flier teaching dog owners about poisonous flowers commonly planted in Portland, as well as how quickly temperatures inside a car can get hot or cold. 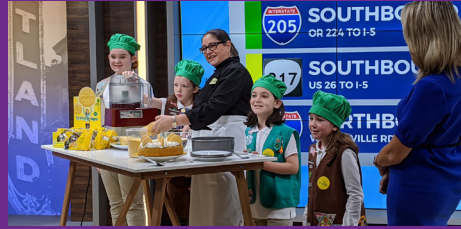

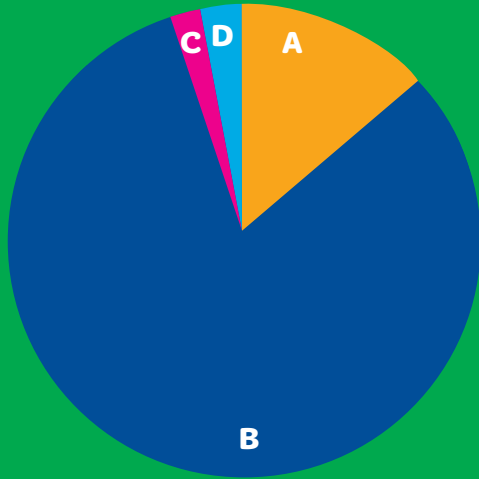

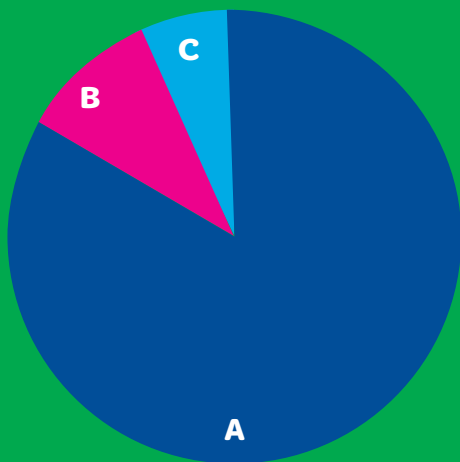
